Introduction


People often face barriers to accessing effective care. Mental health leaders, program implementers, and decision makers need support to deliver and sustain the most effective treatments.

CMHIS offers implementation support - free, tailored consultation/coaching, training, and resources focused on how to prepare for, implement, and sustain mental health practices and programs.

Needs Assessment Purpose

We assessed the needs and preferences of staff and leaders implementing mental health practices in state and local agencies, community mental health centers, or related settings. Our goal was to better understand Implementers' needs and preferences around implementation support and CMHIS's 8 Core Topics.

What We Did (Methods & Procedures)

Recruitment & Dissemination: The anonymous, voluntary online survey was shared broadly (email, LinkedIn, CMHIS website, Hub networks and events).

Eligibility: Participants self-selected if they worked in organizations that oversee or directly provide mental health services and were involved in selecting, adapting, or implementing practices.

Participants: We analyzed responses from 183 respondents.

Who Participated?


Respondents worked at **community mental health centers** or other mental health programs (36%), **non-profit** or social service organizations (22%), **government agencies** (16%), or **educational settings** (15%).

Most respondents identified as white (65%) and non-Hispanic (85%) and over half of the respondents were front-line staff clinicians (54%).

All 5 bi-regional Hubs were represented in the survey data.

About the Organizations


Geographic Areas Served



Respondents' organizations mostly served local areas. They are based in urban (48%), rural (45%), suburban (42%), and frontier (9%) locations. Percentages exceed 100% because organizations could select more than one location type.


Organization Size

Most respondents work at organizations with over 60 employees (58%).



Likelihood of participating in support

Almost all respondents (96%) shared that they would be somewhat or very likely to participate in implementation support on CMHIS's 8 Core Topics.






Topics for Implementation Support

In thinking about their organizations' strengths and areas for improvement, respondents rated all 8 Core Topics around a 3, or mid-way between area of improvement or strength. Respondents scored Communications and Social Marketing solutions the lowest (mean=2.8) and Community Engagement and Needs Assessment the highest (mean=3.5).

These results suggest there is opportunity to support organizations in making each of the 8 Core Topics into an area of strength.

Perceived Areas of Strength & Improvement



Examples of what Implementers want to know or do related to the 8 Core Topics



Community Engagement & Needs Assessment:

"...it would be useful to know methods and techniques for assessing the needs of beneficiaries in the community and specific intervention methods adapted to their needs."



Factors Influencing Implementation: "We need to grow our capacity to be able to tailor our offerings more to our specific communities."



Measurement-based Care: "Educating staff and all stakeholders on importance of thorough and accurate documentation and data collection (to encourage their compliance and buy-in!)"



Program Evaluation: "Would be helpful to have a template or some guidance on developing an evaluation plan with metrics or measures to help monitor and track progress, which will help communities that we work with make informed decisions."



Priorities for Implementation Support

Implementers prefer tailored implementation support that meets their organization's needs and provides concrete and actionable strategies.


"Plans developed for urban counties are not a fit for us. For buy-in, we'd need support familiar with Appalachian communities and the restrictions (such as financial and stigma) that would impact the implementation of services. Both have a large role in long-term sustainability."

Implementers want to work with facilitators who are engaging, have experience working in the field, and can support them over time.

"We are more likely to engage in sustained support efforts when there is an ongoing relationship...One-off webinars are helpful, but trusted ongoing relationships are what really help us grow."

What Implementers Value

Implementers value implementation support that is:



Implementers are motivated to participate in implementation support when there is:

"Flexible scheduling and asynchronous opportunities."

"Ongoing relationship or point-of-contact—a person or team who understands our context, checks in periodically, and can help us troubleshoot implementation challenges over time.

One-off webinars are helpful, but trusted ongoing TA relationships are what really help us grow."

Summary

CMHIS's needs assessment survey findings highlight:

- Organizations are highly interested in participating in implementation support.
- Support works best when it is purposeful, tailored, interactive, co-created, and accessible.
- Organizations have room for growth in all 8 Core Topics.
